## Bideawee's Long-Stay Animals get a Little Extra Love from a Wantagh Volunteer



# **Introducing 'The Adopters Welcome' Policy**

Bideawee recently instituted the Humane Society of the United States "Adopters Welcome" process at each location. The Adopters Welcome philosophy celebrates people's willingness to adopt a pet, and removes artificial and unnecessary barriers to the adoption process. This approach welcomes people to open their homes and hearts to animals in need and recognizes that no matter how good a shelter is, dogs and cats are better off living in loving adoptive homes. We now welcome adopters 18 and older, and do not require meeting with all members of the family (including other pets as well). Meetings will be done on a case-by-case basis. We will be relying on the knowledge and skills of our trained matchmakers do continue to do what they do best, which is to make smart, healthy, happy matches between people and pets. We look forward to placing even more animals into loving forever homes.


### Ask Mike Rueb, CPDT (Certified Pet Dog Trainer)

basically means that she wants things quickly and has a hard time being patient. So we're working on her learning to wait. We practice with Tori in different ways. For instance, when Tori's being good, I ask her to come towards me and then sit. Once she does this, I reward her with a cookie or by petting her. We always have Tori sit before we open a door to go outside so that she knows once she calms down we can go for a walk. As long as Tori can have somebody who can teach her to be calm and gentle, she'll thrive. She'll do great in a home if the person has a lot of energy and time for training. She knows her commands really well and is very motivated. Tori can already sit and lie down! She also likes to play with toys and balls, and is good about dropping them. With a little bit of training she can make an awesome pet for somebody."

toes, so we nursed him back to health and have been taking care of him ever since. He's a very good cat but is very particular about what home he wants to have. He can co-exist with other cats although he would prefer to be your only cat. He's very food motivated and has even learned certain tricks, like "sit." Ashanti is a little nervous and uncomfortable about being pet, although he has made a lot of progress in the last few years. He'll happily allow you pet him if you promise to give him food at the same time. When it's very calm in the adoption center, he will allow some petting and will let you know when he wants his space. Although he doesn't love being handled, Ashanti enjoys being around people and loves to be in the midst of it all. Despite this, Ashanti is incredibly playful and loves to chase feather toys. Ashanti is looking for a patient and calm home where he can have the time to open up and show you his true personality."
